Queen Anne Style • circa 1890-1892  
George & Maude Jasper House

Between 1890 and 1892, the George and Maude Jasper House, 1269 Park Place, was built in the Queen Anne style. A hundred years later, the original brick had been covered over by pink aluminum siding. In 2004, tackling a monumental rescue, the current owners, Russ and Angel Knoverek, brought the structure back to its former glory as a single family residence. Original pocket doors were put back in place, and one can once again admire the exquisite fireplace ornamentation, and stained glass transom windows. Also of note is the heavily carved main staircase, displaying intricate carpentry skills of Quincy's craftsmen. Note the heavily carved newel posts, the beaded banister and its spindle work with centered rosettes. Also look for the butler's bench which is tucked in the corner opposite the mosaic-tiled vestibule.

The back parlor is separated from the front parlor with pocket doors which Russ happily found in the garage. He had to rebuild the wall for the doors which had been removed when the house was divided into apartments. Off the dining room is the former "smoking room" which has a corner fireplace with a hunting motif in the brown tiles. The kitchen has been enlarged by modifying the back stairs and covering the back set of basement steps, as well as incorporating the former side door hallway.
