



The Edward and Frances Luegering, 1912
2011 Prairie Avenue
Craftsman Style

The home at 2011 Prairie was built in 1912 by Edward and Frances Luegering. Mr. Luegering was the bookkeeper at Ricker National Bank, 415 Hampshire, until the bank merged with Quincy National Bank. Luegering later opened his own business, Edjol batteries, building storage batteries. It was located in the rear of his later home at 315 Jersey. The Luegerings had two daughters, Mrs. Clinton Norris and Mrs. William Rexing. Luegerings sold the house to William and Maud Tapp in 1923. Mr. Tapp was employed at Irwin Paper Company.

This home is Craftsman style with touches of Tudor Revival in the diamond windows and the bay windows. The interior features dark stained oak beamed ceilings throughout with matching woodwork that has a cross and button at each corner of the windows in each room.

A transom window can be found over the front door. A window seat graces the foyer. The home has narrow oak flooring throughout. The main rooms on the first floor have pocket doors. A green tile fireplace surrounded by a simple oak mantle highlights the living room.
