The Bradshaw House is an outstanding example of High Victorian eclecticism and a major residential landmark of North Side Quincy. The Bradshaw House was constructed in 1877 on a site neighboring several prominent men of Quincy; the businessman and bank cashier Frederick W. Meyer, the attorney and circuit judge William B. Powers, the attorney Jackson Grimshaw, and the attorney and circuit judge William Marsh. James T. Bradshaw married Miss Sarah Margaret Young on October 5, 1865 as he (cont'd)
