# Royal couple enjoys Quincy hospitality

A German prince and princess visited a Midwestern city of German heritage Friday, and the couple ended the day saying they felt welcome and at home in Quincy.

City and county officials hosted Prince Ferdinand and Princess Elizabeth of Buedingen, Germany, as they acted "as scouts" for their family enterprises, the prince said. "As we travel, my four brothers and I act as scouts looking for places to possibly build a new factory at some time in the future," Ferdinand said.

Local officials say economic development is a consideration in the preliminary visit, "but talking about a factory now would be very premature," said Jim Mentesti, director of the Great River Economic Development Foundation, and host for the couple.

The royal family are descendants of the 1,000-year-old House of Ysenburg, and have several business interests in Europe and North America. One business is a pottery manufacturer, Ronningen Pottery, with facilities in Germany and Spain, and sales offices in the United States.

"Actually, my younger brother manages the pottery concerns," Ferdinand said. He said Quincy would make a good location for any business. "I will make my report when I return, then we shall see."

The couple was impressed with the city's emphasis of its German roots. "We were very surprised at the German heritage here," Ferdinand said. "It was nice to see the restoration of the German area (Caltown), and the beautiful castle (Villa Kathrine). I'll come back when it is finished," he quipped.

"It is important to restore old homes and give people the opportunity to go back to their roots," he said. "I congratulate the people of Quincy for providing that opportunity."

The couple attended a reception at the Quincy Country Club where more than 200 people turned out to meet

them, including Sen. Laura Kent Donahue, R-48. "I just think (the visit) is fantastic," Donahue said. "It's world-wide recognition for Quincy and, they are royalty, but they are normal people. It's important to get to know them."

Mayor Verne Hagstrom agreed. "It's an opportunity for more exposure. This has been a wonderful day and visit, and these people are going to go back to Germany and tell of the beautiful German community on the Mississippi River," Hagstrom said. "How could anyone not want to settle in Quincy?"

The prince and princess said they hope to return to Quincy in "the autumn or possibly next spring."

"The Midwest is beautiful," Princess Elizabeth said. "We have friends here, and it is so much more comfortable to visit a place when you have better contact and someone to show you around."

Neither would point out any single tour highlight, but both enjoyed a visit to Hedy's German Bakery. "It was an old-fashioned German bakery," Ferdinand said. "Like the ones at home, it was cozy and comfortable — a nice place to sit down and enjoy coffee and cakes."

"But normally, in Germany, we would also enjoy a little schnapps," he added.

Suzanne WOEFEL Z. known as the tavern owner of the building on s.w. corner, 8th & Locust that is now (1994 and earlier...) owned by the Elligsen Family. The Elligsens first used the building as a bakery; now only their residence. (Cf. Ms QUINCY-ARCHITECTURE)..

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Emma had a half-sister, daughter of Suzanne and Wilper; she was adopted by Woefel.

## THE SUZANNE WOELFEL HAUS

1537-39 NORTH 8<sup>TH</sup> STREET  
QUINCY, ILLINOIS

A brief history excerpted from the article in the QUINCY HERALD WHIG of Dec. 16, 1984.

The Suzanne Woelfel Haus provides an interesting story in itself.

The structure has had a long and "checkered" history; however its beginnings were "quite a colorful period indeed.

The building's high period was between 1885 and 1900. At this time it was known as the Lorenz Woelfel Saloon, but the "saloon" was in name only. Due to the customs and accepted mores of the day it was very hard, if not impossible for a woman to run and business in her own name. For this reason many a business venture was fronted by a man while the driving force behind it was usually a "very shrewd and winning woman." Such was the case with Suzanne Woelfel.

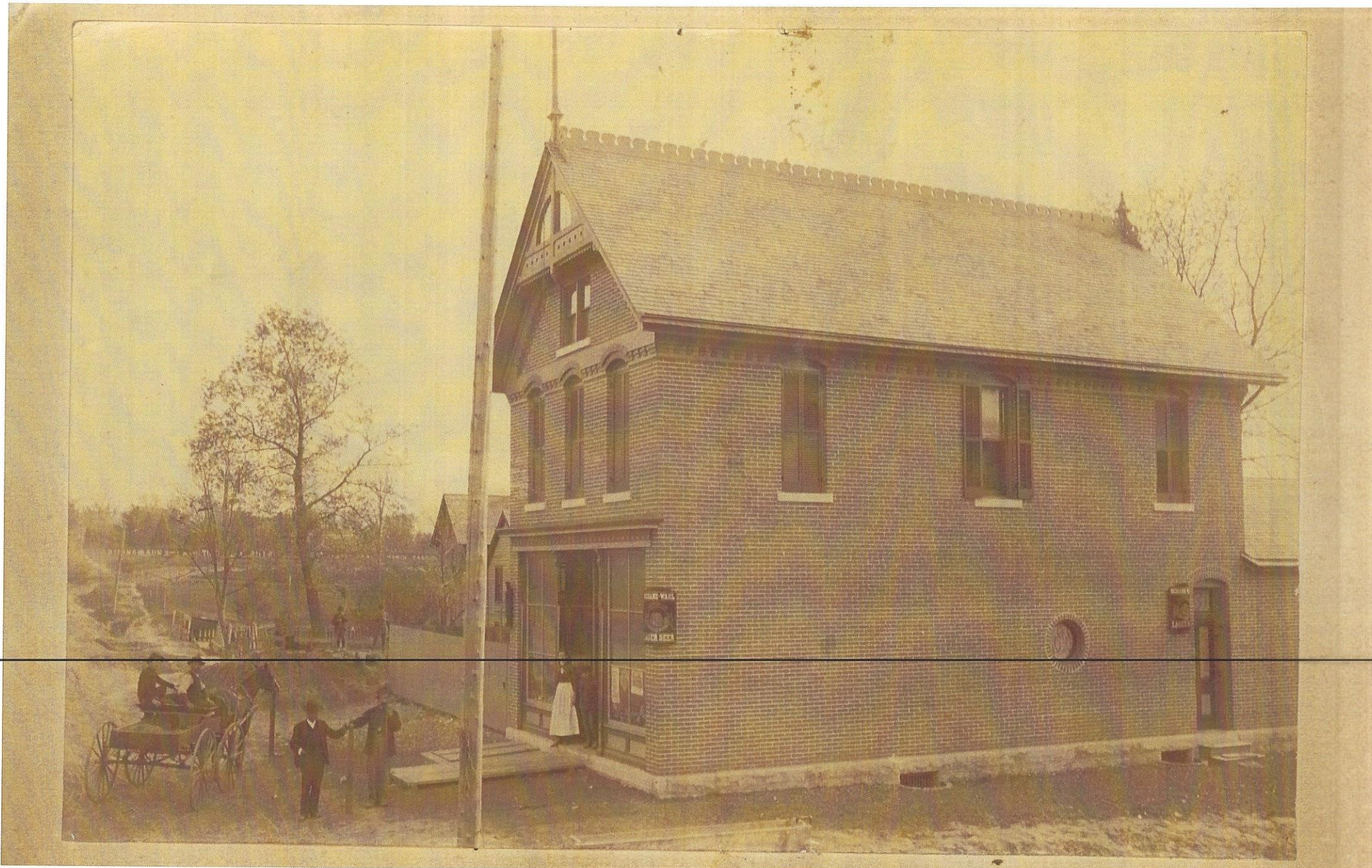
The building was built between 1884 and 1885. It was an Queen Anne "authentic" Bavarian replica down to the last detail including roof orbs, finules, gingerbread and wedding cake moldings. It was built by Lorenz and Suzanne Woelfel as a Bavarian style beer hall. The opening of the building was to coincide with the opening of the Illinois Soldiers and Sailors Home which opened in 1886. The Woelfels also capitalized on the large German population living in that particular area of the north end. The building became an area "hangout" with beer and German food served.

Suzanne Woelfel was a turn-of-the-century "north end character" who was extremely popular and successful. She married a Mr. Wilper in Germany. He died at sea while they were immigrating to America. Shortly thereafter she met another German immigrant, Lorenz Woelfel, and they were married, settling in Quincy.

After the turn of the century and the death of Mrs. Woelfel, who by this time had married for a third time to a Mr. Linneman, the business became the James F. Hedrich Saloon and remained as such until 1912.

In 1915 Edwing Murray opened a grocery store which remained in operation until his death in 1941. Upon taking possession of the building in 1915 Murray decided to "modernize" the building. Whereupon he cut off the three roof orbs. He removed all of the fretwork and most of the brackets and wedding cake moldings.

After Murray died in 1941, the building was converted into apartments. Thereafter, the
