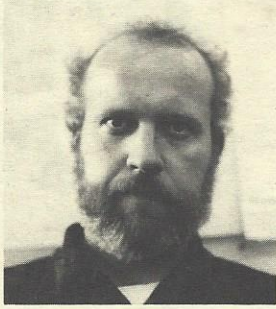


KENNETH MARKUNAS - 1986 QUINCY FELLOWSHIP RECIPIENT

Kenneth Markunas, Quincy Fellowship in Historic Preservation recipient for 1986, will begin his summer residency at the Gardner Museum June 15. Markunas is from Albuquerque, New Mexico, and received his first degree in English in 1972. He was employed there as a regional salesman and distributor for a bakery until 1981, when he enrolled in the College of Architecture at the University of New Mexico. He completed his Bachelor of Architecture degree last year, and was accepted by the School of Architecture - University

of Illinois, working towards his graduate degree. He will have completed his first year there by the time he enters his residency in Quincy.

His particular area of interest is historic preservation. His family owns old apartment buildings in New Mexico, so Kenneth has gained experience in repairing and updating plumbing, heating and structural systems. Recently he was instrumental in com-

pleting an historic survey in Albuquerque and drew maps for an historian who was developing historic districts in northern New Mexico cities. During the summer of 1984, he completed a feasibility study of two old buildings to be restored into a drug re-hab center. His study made re-use recommendations and explained the procedures and benefits of placing the buildings on the National Register of Historic Places.

Markunas will continue the inventory of historic structures in Quincy, which was begun by last year's recipient, Bret Johnson. This inventory information and photographs will be made available to the Quincy Historic Preservation Commission, and the completed inventory will become part of the museum's reference library. He will be available to local historic home and building owners for consultation of color schemes and other suggestions for restoration.

The Gardner Museum, as the major sponsor, is assisted in this year's residency by the Quincy Historic Preservation Commission. The museum looks forward to working with Mr. Markunas this summer. Persons are invited to stop by to meet Ken during the summer to discuss his projects, supply information or ask questions relating to his projects. He will be here June 15 through August 15.

SPECIAL EVENING HOURS AT QUINCY'S MUSEUMS

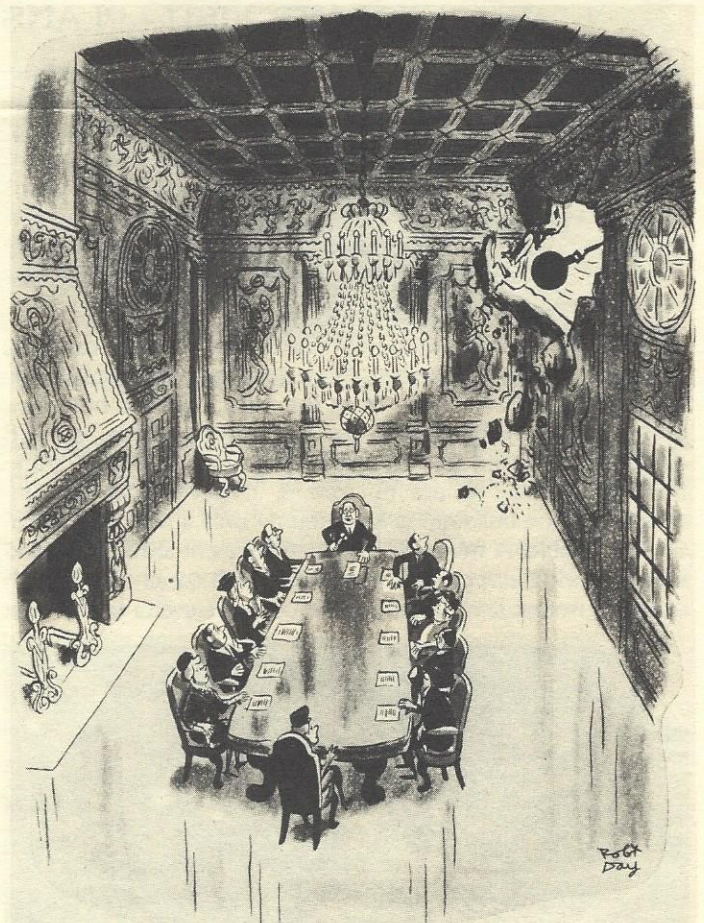
JUNE 12/6:00-8:00 P.M.
